## Camp Update- Phillip Island 2021

Our itinerary is looking great. We're set to be exploring Phillip Island for the last week of term, heading off on Monday morning and returning to school on Friday afternoon. From Churchill Island, the Penguin Parade and Amaz'n Things, to Seal Rocks, the Antarctic Experience, Clip and Climb, the Koala Conservation Centre and plenty more. We'll be bike riding, hiking, climbing, exploring, adventuring and enjoying. A detailed itinerary, permission and medical forms and packing lists will be sent home soon. With School Council agreeing to subsidise camp for all students attending, the total cost per student for camp week is \$550. As suggested throughout last semester, quite a few families have been making payments towards camp costs throughout the year, which is great. The school is required to make the full payment of camp costs prior to our departure and as a result, families are asked to ensure that accounts are finalised before September 13<sup>th</sup>. If your household is experiencing financial hardship, please take some time to discuss this with Jane or Donna so that we can establish a payment plan.

## CFA Anglesea Camp

*Fingers crossed we'll be set to take off on Monday the 23<sup>rd</sup> of August for our leadership program at Anglesea. The itinerary remains the same, with our departure set for after school on Monday and our return set for Wednesday afternoon. Monday night we have some work on our short films planned, then after an early start on the beach on Tuesday morning, we'll spend the day at the local CFA building working with Jamie McKenzie on the much anticipated workshop sessions. We'll be managing 'home life' with a family of 13 children and 2 adults, cooking and keeping house for ourselves. After another early morning on the beach and some finish off activities on Wednesday, we'll make our way back to school. Medical forms completed for our earlier camp booking remain valid, unless there has been a change of health treatment or record for your child. The updated permission form for each student was sent home last week and will need to be completed and returned as soon as possible.*



## Aussie of the Month

At SPS we have registered to participate in the Aussie of the Month program, a primary civics and citizenship recognition program, which is delivered under the auspices of the Australia Day Council's National Network. The focus is to encourage and recognise students for their contribution to their community through a demonstration of Australian values as outlined in the Values for Australian Schooling and Curriculum framework. These are values outside of academic application, instead they're about active contribution to school, community and peer groups.

Each month, students will be nominated and one student will be selected for recognition with an award certificate and badge. We're hoping to invite special visitors along to present the award each month.

## Nude Food

We made a start on the classroom war on waste challenge just before lockdown and we'll pick up from where we left off when we're back on deck. We're collecting all wrappers and landfill packaging for a two week period and we'll be weighing each collection. Our usual sorting of 'scraps' takes place and this means that anything we can use in the worm farm, compost bin, chicken scrap bucket and recycling is used or disposed of elsewhere, leaving only the 'landfill' rubbish and this is what we're trying to reduce. Once we have another week back at school, we'll see which classroom is able to take possession of the War on Waste trophy for the fortnight.

What does a Zero Waste Lunchbox look like?

The typical healthy zero waste lunch is packed in a lunch box or bag. The food is put in **reusable** containers rather than wrapped in disposable packaging, a drink is in a refillable bottle and all containers are resealable so that leftover food and drink can be saved for later.

Nude Food is a fantastic opportunity to educate our children about how their actions can impact the environment and their health. Focussing on the positive message of 'nude food = a healthy body + a healthy planet', we want our students at SPS to be empowered to choose healthy, rubbish free food for their lunches and snacks..

We're trying to work towards a lunch box which only includes foods that leave no packaging at the end of the day. Pop the sandwich or bread roll into a named lunchbox and use small containers for any snack foods and of course, pack a reusable drink bottle. The only thing left at the end of our lunch eating time should be an apple core, crusts or other left over food remnants – which will be sorted to go to our chooks, the worm farm or the compost bay.
